ICE FISHING

With over 60km of rivers and lakes, Lac du Bonnet becomes a hardwater fishing haven all winter long. Of course you can fish anywhere, but a few of our favourite locations are: The Lac du Bonnet Town Dock and Beach, The Laverendrye Boat Launch, The Lac du Bonnet Wildlife Trout Ponds, and Crappie-ville (located on the Lee River near Black Bear Golf Course).

Enjoy hours of fun reeling in master Walleye, Northern Pike, Goldeye, Perch, Bass, Channel Cat, and much more!

SKIING

Get out to experience the tranquil, crisp blankets of snow that cover our forests and trails, transforming them into picturesque winter wonderlands by cross-country skiing through Lac du Bonnet. Agassiz Cross Country Ski Trail offers 11km of groomed skiing trails with gentle slopes, inclines, and plenty of level ground.

The Blue Water South Trail, part of the Trans-Canada Trail, offers skiers a fantastic time on this 10km trail full of level ground and slight inclines in the boreal forest.

Snowmobiling is one of Lac du Bonnet's most popular attractions, with over 500km of groomed trails for you to explore. Lac du Bonnet was named the 2021 SledTown Showdown Champions by SnoRiders West Magazine!

The trails range from a nice flowing ride through a pine forest in the Canadian Shield through swampy and sandy pastureland. The trails and shelters across LdB are maintained by two volunteer organizations, the Eastman SnoPals and the Lee River Snow Riders.

ICE FISHING DERBY

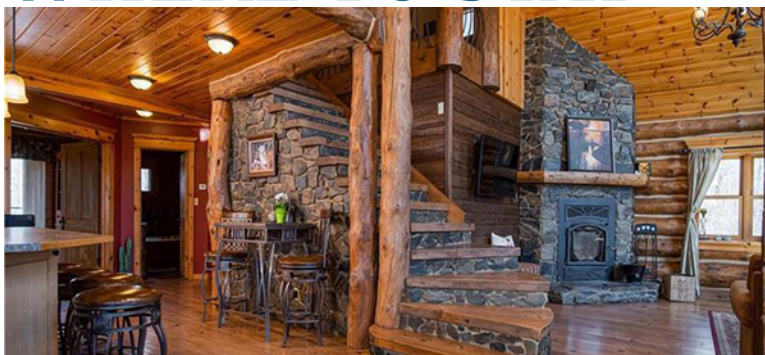
